Robert Breunig FASSA is one of Australia's leading public policy economists. His research is motivated by important social policy issues and debates, and his work is characterised by careful empirical study and appropriate use of statistical techniques. Professor Breunig's research agenda has led to many partnerships with government organisations in Australia and overseas, and he has been a consultant to the private sector on marketing, mergers, bank competition and customer loyalty programs.

Diane Gibson FASSA is currently a distinguished professor (health and ageing) at the University of Canberra. Professor Gibson has held senior management roles in both the university and public service sectors and has made significant national contributions to ageing-related research, policy and practice. In addition to being a fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia, she is a fellow and national board member of the Australian Association of Gerontology, and a previous editor-in-chief of the *Australasian Journal on Ageing*.

John Goss is currently an adjunct associate professor with the Health Research Institute at the University of Canberra. He was previously principal health economist at the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare from 1990 to 2010, responsible for health and welfare expenditure collection, publication and analysis by the institute. He has been an adviser to the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), the World Health Organization and the Chinese National Health Development Research Centre on health expenditure and projections of health expenditure. He is the author of *Projection of Australian Health Care Expenditure by Disease, 2003 to 2033* (Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, 2008), a 2008 report that was commissioned by the National Health and Hospitals Reform Commission.

Jane Hall FASSA is a distinguished professor of health economics at the University of Technology Sydney and immediate past president of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia.

Steven Hamilton is an assistant professor at George Washington University in Washington, DC, and visiting fellow at the Tax and Transfer Policy Institute at The Australian National University (ANU). His research is in public finance and the evaluation of government programs. He is a former Treasury official, where among other things he worked on budget policy.

Richard Holden FASSA is a professor of economics at the University of New South Wales (UNSW) Business School, and president of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia. He received a PhD from Harvard University and was a faculty member at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and the University of Chicago before returning to Australia. He is also a fellow of the Econometric Society.

Diane Hosking is the head of research at National Seniors Australia. Diane completed her PhD in cognitive ageing at the University of Adelaide and CSIRO Human Nutrition. She took up a postdoctoral position at ANU as a research fellow at the Centre of Excellence in Population Ageing Research before joining National Seniors in 2019.

John McCallum FASSA is a social gerontologist educated at University of Queensland, Nuffield College Oxford and Andrus Gerontology Centre LA, and has a special interest in Asia, in particular Japan. He has had university leadership roles as dean, deputy vice-chancellor and the director of TAFE. After his university career he worked at the National Health and Medical Research Council and was the CEO of National Seniors Australia from 2016 to 2023.

Peter McDonald FASSA holds honorary professorial positions at the University of Melbourne and ANU and is the chief investigator of the ARC Centre of Excellence in Population Ageing Research. In 2015, he received the Irene B. Taeuber Award of the Population Association of America and, in 2022, the Laureate Award of the International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP). He was the president of IUSSP from 2010 to 2013.

Rachel Ong Vitorj is an Australian Research Council future fellow and a professor of economics at Curtin University. She is also the managing editor of *Australian Economic Papers*. Her research interests include the role of housing in Australia's ageing population, intergenerational housing concerns and the links between housing and wellbeing outcomes.

Lindy Orthia is a research officer and communicator at the advocacy organisation National Seniors Australia. In her academic roles outside of this she has edited three books and published over 40 peer-reviewed papers and chapters.

David Pearce is the principal and executive director at the Centre for International Economics. He has around 35 years' experience as an applied economist, having worked in a wide variety of industries including agriculture, mining, natural resources, climate and the environment, water, electricity, construction, education, finance as well as international trade and development. David's experience extends beyond Australia to include projects in China, Vietnam, Indonesia, India, Papua New Guinea, Laos, the Philippines, Sri Lanka and Bulgaria. David has undertaken a wide range of projects on climate issues over the past 30 years.

John Piggott AO FASSA is the director of the ARC Centre of Excellence in Population Ageing Research at UNSW, where he is a scientia professor of economics. He has published widely on retirement and pension issues, and in public finance more generally; his research has appeared in leading international economics and actuarial academic journals. He was a panellist on the Henry tax review, and is actively involved in tax and retirement policy debate.

Andrew Podger AO FASSA is an honorary professor of public policy at ANU. He is a former senior public servant. He has published widely on social policy and public administration. He is also a fellow of the (US) National Academy of Public Administration.

Dennis Trewin AO FASSA was the Australian statistician and head of the Australian Bureau of Statistics from July 2000 to January 2007. Prior to that he was the deputy Australian statistician and, from 1992 to 1995, the deputy government statistician in New Zealand. Internationally, Dennis has been president of the International Statistical Institute and the International Association of Survey Statisticians.

Peter Whiteford FASSA is a professor in the Crawford School of Public Policy at ANU. He has also worked with the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) and the Australian government. He has published widely on inequality, child poverty, family assistance and welfare reform.

Mike Woods is a professor of health economics at the University of Technology Sydney. He chairs the editorial board of the biannual report *Australia's Aged Care Sector*. He has been a member of the board of the Australian Digital Health Agency and the Aged Care Financing Authority, deputy chair of the Australian Productivity Commission, and secretary of the ACT Treasury.
