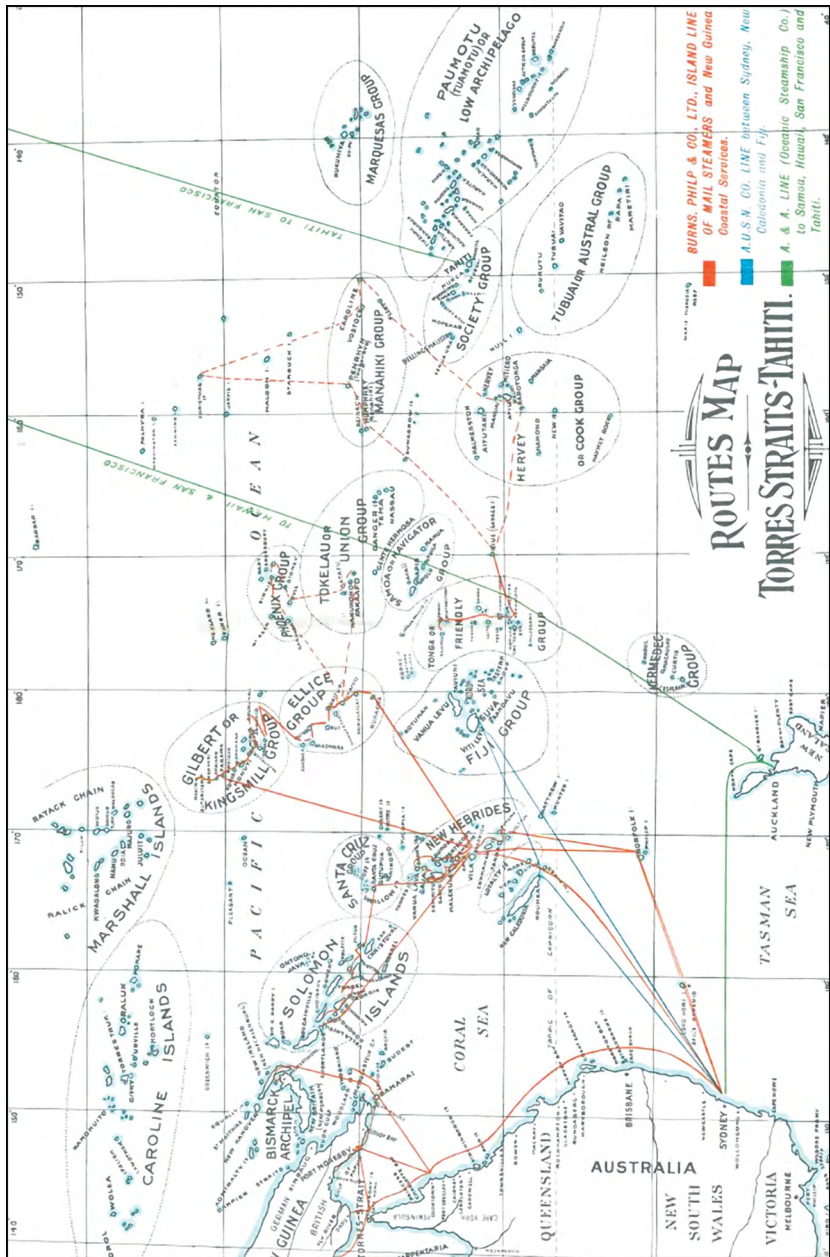


Figure 1: Routes Map Torres Straits–Tahiti.
